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CLARENDON TOWN BOARD Meeting Highlights - March 2023

The Town Board held a Public Hearing prior to the regular meeting regarding a proposed zoning ordinance amendment to allow above-ground propane tanks in mobile home parks. No comments were heard; Deputy Supervisor Allen Robinson opened the regular meeting.

OPEN END

Sandy Shaw, Director of the Community Free Library in Holley spoke to the board about upcoming events in April; Wine Tasting & Farmers' Market will be on April 28, 2023 from 7-9 PM. Vendors will include Hurd Orchards, Stony Meadows Alpacas, The Winery at Marjim Manor, Schulze Vineyards & Winery, Schwenk Wine Cellars, LLC, Victorianbourg Wine Estate, Wild Flour Deli & Bakery and Redwood Trades. The funds raised at this event go toward the children's summer programs. Homeland Security will give a presentation on NYS Citizens' preparedness in case of emergency on April 10, 2023 at 6:30 PM.

HIGHWAY/WATER DEPARTMENT REPORT

Superintendent Tracy Chalker reported that the crew has been salting and plowing; with the snow-rainsnow weather, the budget is getting used quickly. Several dead deer have been removed from the roads and dead ash trees are being cleaned up. With the two snows, several mailboxes came down from the weight of the snow; they have been fixed. DEC made a surprise visit at the highway garage. One citation was found; the highway department has to repaint the fuel tanks. Routine water maintenance has been done. Superintendent Chalker reported that the park bench destroyed by vandalism has been removed from the park; it is salvageable. Board members authorized the bench be fixed. The Board accepted the annual 284 form submitted by Superintendent Chalker summarizing planned road work for the year. Superintendent will try to chip-seal as much as possible.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

Chairman Dave Griggs submitted the following written report: 02-28-2023 (Regular meeting) SP 00-001 Old Paths Bible Baptist- Special permit renewal. 4782 Hall Road. Inspected, fee paid, no outstanding complaints. Motion made, seconded, and approved to approve renewal. SP 96-005 Pet's Galore Grooming- Special permit renewal. 4880 S. Holley Road. Inspected, fee paid, no outstanding complaints. Motion made, seconded, and approved to approve renewal. SD 23-01, Pre-Conference for SD 23-01 Site Plan Review for Building lot approval. Judy Peterson 4221 Lake Road, tax id# 87.-3-19.116. Garrett Steiner from DDS Engineering presented the application on behalf of his client. The planning board sees no obvious issues. Applicant's representatives have requested a waiver from pre-conference.

Motion made, seconded and approved to amend the agenda from a pre-conference to a formal application. Motion made, seconded and approved to grant building lot approval. Chairman Griggs updated the Planning Board members regarding Zoning changes. The town board has approved the use of above ground propane storage tanks at Heron Falls mobile home park. Board member Patrick White submitted information from the NYS 2020 Fire Code regarding underground tanks. OIO Ierlan will convey information to Supervisor Moy. Minor language reflecting this change was made to ARTICLE VII, SEC-TION 708 – MOBILE/MANUFACTURED HOME PARK regarding this change and submitted to the Town Board for their approval. As a result of the public hearing for STR (short term rentals) an addition was made to the proposed language regarding STR that addresses parking of trailers and RV's at short term rental locations. 03-14-2023 (Regular Meeting) Canceled due to insufficient agenda items.

SUPERVISOR REPORT

Deputy Supervisor Allen Robinson reported he will attend the Association of Municipalities meeting in Lyndonville; speaker will be Modern Disposal regarding recycling and waste.

CORRESPONDENCE

Congresswoman Tenney has sent a letter to the town regarding the federal appropriations process and deadlines for submitting application for project funding. The supervisor of Hempstead has sent correspondence requesting support in protesting Governor Hochul's proposed housing plan.

OLD BUSINESS

Board members accepted the proposed language for the zoning amendment to allow above ground propane tanks in mobile/manufactured home parks and a SEQR Resolution was adopted providing environmental review of both proposed zoning amendments; propane tanks and short term rentals.

NEW BUSINESS

Resolutions were adopted requesting an increase in sales tax revenue from the county, accepting affirmation of the highway department inventory audit and authorizing USDA access to town properties for trapping invasive pests, specifically mentioned were the European Cherry Fruit Fly and the Box Tree Moth.

Híllsíde Sketches

Horace Peck was born in

Farmington, Connecticut on April 15, 1802. When he was just 14 years old, he was hired to drive cattle, sheep and hogs

to Buffalo, NY. He then traveled to Clarendon, NY to meet his father and family but they were not there. He was able to stay with Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Foster for three weeks until his parents arrived. The family bought a lot in Clarendon and cleared one acre to plant wheat. Times were tough on them for a year and there was very little to eat.





Horace taught school in Clarendon beginning in 1819 for \$10 a month. He taught for the next 10 years and was able to earn more money as he gained more experience.

Horace married Miss Anna White on January 22, 1829. Anna died in 1834. They had 3 children together, Horace, Emily and Warren. He then married Miss Adaline Nichols on January 31, 1836. They had 2

children together, Lewis and Alice. Horace was a member of the Masonic lodge in NY.

Horace Peck was also a farmer in Clarendon and in his later years he grew and sold hops. In 1874 he sold 11 bales of hops for \$186.39 and after paying freight costs he ended up with net proceeds of \$143.19. That is the equivalent of\$4,300 in todays money.

Horace Peck died on March 12, 1887 and was buried in Hillside cemetery.

Clarendon Personalities..... Reprinted from June 2007 Issue

Frederick Frank Seeman, Jr. was born at Strong Memorial Hospital in Rochester, NY on September 10, 1931 to Alice (Stewart) and Fred F. Seeman, Sr. The middle child, Fred grew up with an older sister, Shirley and a younger brother, William. Fred was raised in Rochester and attended the city schools through 9th grade, when he attended a trade school for baking. When he was 12-13 years old, in the summertime, Fred would ride his bicycle to Oak Hill, Locust Hill and Rochester Country Clubs to caddy. He'd earn 75 cents to carry one bag for 18 holes and \$2.50 to carry two bags. He remembers being caddy for Frank Gannett, owner of the D&C News, who Fred said was tight with his money and tips! In the winter months, he'd work at the bowling alley setting pins for the league bowers at \$1.25 for one alley and \$2.50 for two alleys. He remembers paying 11 cents to see a movie and 10 cents to bowl one game! Fred graduated school in 1948 and his father, a Foreman at Beechnut Packing Co. in Rochester, got him a job there, where he worked for 9 ½ years. Fred served the U.S. Marine Corp Reserves from 1948 to 1951 and was drafted into the Army in 1952. He reported for basic training in May and after eight weeks, was moved to Fort Eustis, Virginia near Williamsburg where he was trained in driving tractor trailer trucks. In November of 1952, Private First Class Seeman was sent to Korea with the 19th Group, 8th Army Combat Engineers to move bulldozers, road graders, bridge equipment and any other military equipment that needed transport. Fred remembers heading home from Korea on Christmas Day in 1953 by ship via Japan, where uniforms from Korean service were turned in for a new issue of fatigues and a dress uniform to enter the United States. From Japan, he was moved to San Francisco where they flew him to the base in New Jersey for final discharge from military service. When Fred returned to Rochester, he went back to his old job at Beechnut Packing until 1957 when he went to work for Wilmont Castle Co. in Henrietta where he assembled hospital sterilizers for pharmaceutical companies all over the



world. Fred worked for Wilmont Castle until his retirement in 1994. While in Korea, Fred corresponded with one of his cousins in Kendall and her girlfriend Annette. When he was discharged, he met Annette; they were married in 1953 and raised two children Brenda and Paul in North Chili. Divorced in 1965, Fred moved back to Rochester. On a bowling league for Wilmont Castle, Fred remembers when he met Carole Coombs at the 'Bowl-A-Roll' on Jefferson Road. Carole was there with her friends and a group of them ended up going out. Fred's first car was a 1939 Ford and in the 50's and 60's, owned at least ten other cars. He would buy them and fix them up to sell. Doing most of the mechanic work himself, he'd have the paint job done by someone else. Fred and Carole will celebrate 42 years of happy marriage this year. Fred says that no one thought they'd last with only a six week courtship! Four of Fred's children live in the area. Paul, a truck driver for Upstate Milk and bus driver for Churchville-Chili Schools lives in North Chili. Fred, working at Eastman Kodak in Rochester, lives in Clarendon. Jim, a carpenter at Comfort Windows, lives in North Chili and Matt, a Nurse's Aide at the Batavia V.A., lives in Brockport. Fred's daughter Brenda lives in Lansing Michigan and stays busy home schooling her children. Going into 14 years of retirement. Fred.
