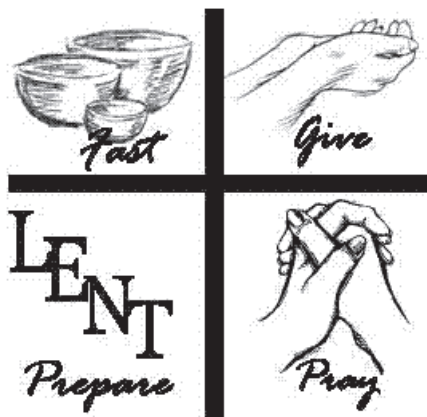

Hillside Cemetery

Roland B Farnsworth
Oct. 27, 1812 - Jan. 10, 1879

In his obituary it was noted that Roland was the first white child born in the Town of Murray and the second white child in what at the time was known as Orleans County.

It also stated that he was a champion of free education and an active worker in the Temperance Reform Movement. In his life he witnessed the completion of the Erie Canal and the building of the Central Railroad.

In 1863 he was elected Supervisor for the Town of Murray and served for 9 years as a Democrat which was very rare. It was written in one particular publication that Eldredge Farwell and Roland Farnsworth were "Copperheads" who placed loyalty to their party over loyalty to their country. That may be a debate for another time!



Clarendon resident Jak Kohmann was among a group of people who were named Outstanding Citizen for 2018. Jak has been a driving force in Troop 59 for the past 16 years. The Boy Scout Troop in Clarendon has had 32 boys earn the rank of Eagle Scout under his guidance. Jak challenges the boys to "think big" and do projects that will make an impact on the community. Many people have had the opportunity to see these boys in action and they take this very seriously. They have support from Jak, the other leaders, their parents and the community. Jak has stayed involved in scouting long after his own son made Eagle which is a testament to the type of individual he is.

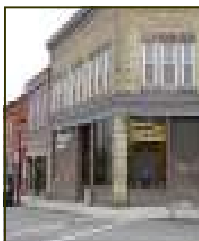

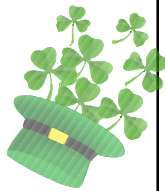

CLARENDON TOWN BOARD - Meeting Highlights February 2019

OPEN END

Supervisor Moy acknowledged Attorney Karl Essler, the Town's Special Counsel, will be retiring at the end of the month and will now have a minor part-time practice of his own. Attorney Essler will continue to help with WIBA 12 and WD 13 legal business through the end of the projects. Attorney Essler thanked all he has worked with in Clarendon; that this town has developed in a smart and logical fashion. Board members acknowledged thanks to Attorney Essler for all his good, straight forward and very thorough advice through the years and wished him well in retirement.

HIGHWAY/WATER REPORT

Superintendent Swanger reported dealing with plowing, salt-ing, freezing rain and snow the past month and many down trees from the wind. March 5 and 6, he will go with other Superintendents to Albany for the annual request of CHIPS money. Superintendent reported resident's frozen waterlines over the weekend causing leaks. The town's ten year old pressure washer has died. It is used all the time and Superintendent Swanger approximated \$5000 to replace it; a new one is needed. Jamie Mathes, town seasonal worker at Hillside Cemetery also works part-time with the Sheriff's Office and brings prisoners to the highway garage on weekends to clean the shop and trucks. They also help clean-up at the cemetery in the summer.

HISTORIAN/HISTORICAL SOCIETY REPORT

Historian Ierlan submitted the following written report: A reminder that Marlies DiFante will be here to speak next week, Wednesday Feb. 27th at 6pm, hope you can attend and please let people know about it. She is the author of the book Queen of the Bremen which is about her life as a child whose family was stuck in Germany when World War II broke out. This month I have been busy organizing files and putting together my storage at the stone store. I have collected several boxes of books to be donated to the Town of Barker and they are also stored in the building. I have been contacted by a couple students at GCC asking for community service work and will likely utilize them to continue organizing. The Orleans County Heritage Festival is in the planning stages and I have been asked about putting together a tour of the cemetery. I will be working on this, Matt Ballard, County Historian, has offered to help too. The signs for the 4 pioneer cemeteries have been ordered. It will be a couple of months before we get them and they will be placed as soon as they come in.

I took a trip to the Chicago Field Museum this month with the sole purpose of seeing the Akeley items that are there. I went with Florence Tice and met my friend John Janelli from New Jersey and he set us up with a most fantastic behind the scenes access. I spoke to the librarian in charge of photographs and digitization and she provided me with some images of Akeley that we did not have. I was able to provide her with a thumb drive of scans from the large amount of personal letters and photos we received from Delbert Chambers a couple of years ago. They were from Carl Akeley's great niece Caron Akeley. The museum was delighted to get this. I saw the skull and the skin of the leopard that Akeley wrestled and killed on one of his trips to Africa. My favorite part of the visit was seeing the special display of the Akeley movie camera along with film shot in the 1920's using it.

We were given an original 1920 publication titled "Lion Spearing" which was printed by the museum to showcase the bronze statues done by Akeley for the museum. I spoke to several department heads and they are discussing the possibility of long term loaning some Akeley mounts to us. These are mounts that are not currently being displayed as they need some restoration but would be perfect for the town to be able to display. Stay tuned!

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

Chairman David Griggs submitted the following written report: **01-22-2019 (Regular meeting)** Planning Board members reviewed a draft of Zoning Ordinance updates & local Law changes being proposed for submittal to the Town Board for their consideration and approval. The General consensus was to recommend abolishing existing Local Law # 3 of the year 2014, Regulating the outside storage of Junk Materials and instead adopting the International Property Maintenance Code as the definite authority when it comes to property maintenance issues in the Town of Clarendon. A motion was made, seconded and approved to submit proposed revisions to the Town Board for their review. **02-12-2019 (Regular Meeting)** SD 19-01, Pre-Conference for a one (1) lot subdivision, Shirley Taylor, 5085 Holley Byron Road, tax id#109.-1-60. Applicant is re-subdividing Two (2) parcels previously merged back to their original state. No issues were noted. The applicant requested in writing to wave pre-conference and proceed to formal application. A motion was made, seconded and approved to change the agenda from a pre-conference to a formal. A motion was made, seconded and approved to declare this an exempt subdivision for SEQRA purposes. A motion was made, seconded and approved to approve SD 19-01 using original survey maps and contingent upon receipt by the OIO of finalized creation and filing of deeds.

SUPERVISOR REPORT

Supervisor Moy informed that the Governor has restored the AIM state funding to municipalities. Clarendon's aid is \$11,600. Other towns in Orleans County receive more, up to \$40,000. Supervisor explained that the Governor had pulled the funding after town budgets were adopted, depending on the AIM aid; that it could have been disastrous for some towns if not restored. NYSDOT, in accordance with the Highway Beautification Law, conducts an annual sign surveillance of every road eligible for federal aid, this includes Route 31A in Clarendon.

CORRESPONDENCE

The Orleans County Association of Municipalities has sent a welcome to 2019 letter, informing dues for the year are \$40 per Town/Village. Beth Skehan, Church Street resident, has sent a proposal to care for the town hall gardens for 2019. Traffic diversion proceeds of \$1,333.34 has been received for the period of October through December, 2018. Proposals to mow Pioneer Cemeteries and town properties have been received from Kingdollar Lawn Care and A&K Lawn and Garden. The Orleans County Treasurer has sent an abstract of payments made to the town from the county in the year 2018.

OLD BUSINESS

The Board discussed maintenance plans for the town hall furnaces; this was put on hold until the March meeting. Bond Resolutions were adopted for both WIBA 12 and WD 13. Estoppel Notices for each will be published, giving a 20 day period for opposition of the spending.

NEW BUSINESS

Minimum Wage rates adopted in January were corrected from \$11.80 per hour to the state designated \$11.10 per hour. Mowing and gardening contracts were approved as submitted for the 2019 season. Amendments to the Zoning Ordinance, Local Law 1 of 2015 pertaining to Outside Storage of Junk Materials and Local Law 1 of 2005 pertaining to Subdivision Regulations were discussed. Proposed amendments include minor changes to correct clerical errors, clarify intent and update references to regulatory codes. In 2016 the State Fire Prevention and Building Code Council completed a major update to the State Uniform Fire Prevention and Building code, adopting among other codes, the International Property Maintenance Code, which is being considered for replacement of the current Outside Storage of Junk Materials law. New amendments to the State Environmental Quality Review Act were adopted by New York State effective January 1, 2019. These need to be incorporated into the Town's Subdivision Regulations. Public hearings for these amendments have been set for March 19, 2019 beginning at 6:30 PM, each one immediately following the foregoing conducted hearing. The Town Board authorized expenditure of highway monies for 2019 and discussed water maintenance fees for apartments. It was stated that the maintenance fee is charged per meter not per roadside tap.
