Clarendon Personalities

In honor of his 100th birthday on May 16, 2019 this personality column is being reprinted from the Oct 2006 issue of the Gazette.



Joseph Angelo

Andreano was born on May 16, 1919 in Rochester, NY, the number five of seven sons to Cosmo and Michalina Andreano. Joe has been a Clarendon resident since 1969 and he now lives with his wonderful wife Grace on the South Manning Road. They were married in August 1944, and have just celebrated their 62nd Anniversary. When I asked Grace the secret to their obviously suc-

cessful marriage, she said "Marriage is *all* give and take. You need to discuss things and work them out together. It takes work and nothing worth it is easy." Grace is amazed and very proud of Joe.

Joe left high school in tenth grade and went to work as a mason contractor. He worked for the City of Rochester Urban Renewal as a rehabilitation specialist, the Building Bureau in property maintenance and then in Water Works until he retired. After retiring from the City of Rochester, Joe became New York State certified and served as Clarendon's Building Inspector for a salary of \$25/month. He instituted the change of building permit fees from a flat \$25 each to a charge per square footage and certificate of occupancy.

In 1938 Joe enlisted in the U.S. Army. He met Grace in 1943 and they married August 10th in 1944 when Joe was home on a ten-day furlough. Joe was shipped overseas for 1 ½ years and it was December when he came home. That's when he and 'Gracy' (as he calls her) started their life together. Joe fought in the Battle of the Bulge and served in the Army Infantry 75th Division. He's been awarded both a bronze and silver star for his service in the U.S. Military. Just recently, Joe received a Plaque for the 2006 Man of the Year from the Veterans 75th Division.

Joe and Grace moved to Clarendon from Rochester with their daughters Grace Elizabeth and Vinessa Jo, to escape the riots that had begun in the city. They purchased a seven room farmhouse with two barns and 65 acres of land on the Mansfield and Manning Roads, and raised their family.

Residents that know him feel "Joe is quite a guy!" An active senior citizen, Joe decided that instead of being a 'couch potato', he would go back to school. At age 78, he took the high school equivalence test and earned his General Education Degree with one of the highest scores in his group. He then attended Genesee Community College, where he earned his Associates Degree in Liberal Arts & Science General Education. Joe continued his schooling and at age 82, he received his Graduate Degree in Criminal Justice from Brockport State University. Channel 12 News out of Rochester, NY interviewed Joe for his accomplishments. When asked why he decided to go back to school at his age, Joe said it was for his own self esteem. Brockport College has claimed Joe Andreano to be the oldest person to ever graduate from their facility with a degree. Joe became an artist while attending GCC and he loves to paint using mostly water color and some acrylic paints. A number of Joe's many paintings

are hanging in his home and some are on display at the Holley Community Library. Of course, Joe has given many to his friends. Joe told the newscaster that he'd like to see if his talent on canvas was good enough to sell and decided he needs a good agent for that! Joe is hoping to be recognized as a new artist in the D&C newspaper, Living Section.

One thing that Joe really enjoyed was attending school with the young people. Geary Shenck shared his thoughts in that "Knowing Joe,

I'm sure they enjoyed him too. Joe is quite a guy and best of all, a good neighbor." About education, Joe feels that teachers need more freedom on how to approach topics instead of the repeated lessons, confined to the text books. He thinks college should be more challenging and is too systemized; that it should allow teachers and youth to challenge and expand their minds. Joe's message to the youth is "Don't waste your time while in school. Work hard, do your homework, get good grades and then when you're out, *use your mind!*"

In October of 2009, the Genesee-Orleans Regional Arts Council sponsored an exhibit at its Satellite Gallery in the Shirt Factory Cafe on West Center Street in Medina, displaying 23 of Joe's paintings in various media, the second public showing of the then 90-year old's artwork.

CLARENDON TOWN BOARD - Meeting Highlights May 2019

Orleans County Legislator Bill Eick reported that construction of the new county building is complete and that the furniture is now being moved in. There will be a ribbon cutting ceremony on June 11, 2019 at 3:30 PM; this would be a good time for anyone wanting to tour the building to come. Councilman Allen Robinson acknowledged Bob Freida, Assistant Chief of the Clarendon Fire Company for the quick response in handling the fire on Church Street; that it could have been a big problem. Thank you.

HIGHWAY/WATER DEPARTMENT REPORT

Superintendent Larry Swanger reported that the rainy weather keeps delaying summer work needed to be done. Most of the lawn restoration (due to snow plow damage) has been done. The grader needed/has been repaired. The Highway employees have attended Hazmat training and obtained excavator operator certification as required now by New York State. One grave was dug this month and the annual water quality report has been completed and mailed to those hooked-up to the public water system. The Highway crew ground out a few stumps in town and at the cemetery. Dirt roads have been graded. Superintendent Swanger reported his plans to pave the dirt portion of Brown Schoolhouse Road beginning on May 29, 2019 but that may be delayed. A new home is being built there and trucks are hauling dirt to the site. Superintendent doesn't want the trucks on the road after just being paved. He has grindings to use, helping cut the project cost. Superintendent informed that he has paved eight or nine miles of dirt road since being in office.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

Chairman David Griggs submitted the following written report: **04-23-2019 (Regular Meeting)**

SD 19-04 -The Planning Board held a pre-conference for a subdivision/merger, tax id#'s 87.-4-55 and 87.-4-46, John Rehbach, William Gray. No issues were noted with the proposal, Applicant requests waiver of pre-conference. A motion was made, seconded, and approved to amend the agenda from a pre-conference to a formal. A motion was made, seconded and approved to approve Subdivision contingent on OIO verification of merger of the two parcels.

SD 19-05, Pre-conference for a Special Use Permit for a storage facility located on the corner of Hall Road and 4th Section Road (31A) in the Business/Commercial District. Tax id# 99.-2-37.4. Tabled pending further information/clarification.

SP 03-14 - Special Permit renewal, Urban League of Rochester LLC, 17179 Fourth Section Road, Akeley Manor and Akeley Landing. Fee paid, inspected, no outstanding complaints. A motion was made, seconded and approved for renewal.

04-14-2019 (Regular meeting)

SD 19-05, Pre-conference for a Special Use Permit for a storage facility located on the corner of Hall Road and Fourth Section Road (31A) in the Business/Commercial District. Tax id# 99.-2-37.4. The Planning Board continued review of this proposal. Numerous items were discussed (lighting, buffering, emergency vehicle access, snow removal, drainage, security, etc.) No significant issues were noted with this proposal, Applicant requests waiver of pre-conference.

A motion was made, seconded, and approved to amend the agenda from a pre-conference to a formal. A public hearing will be scheduled at 7:00 prior to the next regularly scheduled Planning Board meeting (May 28), regular meeting to immediately follow. A SEQRA needs to be performed, request FD review of emergency vehicle access, and Applicant needs to prepare and provide a drainage plan. Item remains open.

SP 05-01, Special Permit renewal, Chris Neff Auto Repair, 5360 Upper Holley Road. Fee paid, inspected, no outstanding complaints. A motion was made, seconded and approved for renewal.

HISTORIAN REPORT

Historian Melissa Ierlan submitted the following written report: We have had two programs at the Historical Society so far. They were very well attended. Larry Swanger and his guys transported two safes donated by the Robishaws. One belonged in the old town hall and the other to former Supervisor D. Daum. They are in the CHS museum. I gave a presentation at the D.A.R. (Daughters of American Revolution) House on Saturday about the Akeley Fox and Carl Akeley. Carl Akeley was born 155 years ago this week.

CORRESPONDENCE

The Town received revenues from the Traffic Diversion Program in the amount of \$1076.59 from the county. The Orleans County Legislature sent resolutions they've adopted; Opposing driver's license access and privacy act concerning undocumented individuals and Opposing NYS Senate & Assembly bill to enact the farmworkers fair labor practices act. LaBella Associates has sent information on the NYS 2019 Consolidated Funding available. Orleans County Board of Elections sent information on the upcoming Primary Election in the Republican Party to be held on June 25, 2019. Voting hours will be from 12 noon until 9PM. Mortgage Tax revenue has been received in the amount of \$13,432.68. National Grid has sent notification of routine tree maintenance from 5/20/2019 to 3/31/2020. New York State DEC has approved the mining permit for Hard Times Gravel Pit on New Guinea Road. MRB Group has submitted its engineer report on the structural assessment of second floor storage at the Stone Store, 16301 East Lee Road.

NEW BUSINESS

The Board authorized the signing of a two year contract renewal with Municipal Solutions for financial services and an amendment to the NYS Snow & Ice Agreement for 2018/2019 winter severity. The Town Board adopted resolutions opposing driver's license access and privacy act concerning undocumented people and opposing NYS bill to enact farmworkers fair labor practices act.
