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CLARENDON TOWN BOARD - Meeting Highlights November 2019

Sandy Shaw, Director of the Holley Community Library, informed that now is the Library's Season of Giving. This is the same day as the Night of Lights in the Village. Santa will be at the Library around 5:00 PM to visit with the children. On Sat., December 14th from 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM, residents are invited to make Christmas Cards for Veterans to give them thanks. Supplies will be supplied by the library and Director Shaw will be delivering them to the different organizations in the community.

HIGHWAY/WATER DEPARTMENT REPORT

In Superintendent Swanger's absence, Supervisor Moy reported that the crew has been plowing and sanding/salting already this year. The men have been working on the equipment. Six water meters have been changed/replaced.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

Chairman David Griggs submitted the following written report: 10-22-2019 (Regular Meeting) SD 19-16 - The Planning Board held a pre-conference for a three (3) lot subdivision, Charles Moore, New Guinea Road tax# 119.-2 -55.1. No issues were noted with the proposal, Applicant requests waiver of pre-conference. A motion was made, seconded, and approved to amend the agenda from a preconference to a formal. A motion was made, seconded and approved to declare this a minor subdivision for SEQRA purposes. A motion was made, seconded and approved to approve SD 19-16 as submitted contingent upon creation and filing of deeds. SP 06-01- Special Permit renewal, Tim McCullough 5375 Upper Holley Road, Best Rentals Inc. Fee paid, inspected, no outstanding complaints. A motion was made, seconded and approved for renewal.

Clarendon Town Historian dressed as the Cat in the Hat, and read to Mrs. Montague's first grade class.

By unanimous consent the board approved recommending to the town board for their approval the appointment of alternate Planning Board member Karen Bradshaw to fulfill the remaining unexpired term of resigned member Eric Bradshaw, term to expire 12-31-2021, 11-12-2019 (Regular Meeting) Meeting canceled due to lack of sufficient agenda items. The next regularly scheduled Planning Board meeting is 7:00 PM, November 26, 2019 at the Clarendon Town Hall, 16385 Church Street.

SUPERVISOR REPORT

Supervisor Moy reported that the budget is under the tax cap.

CORRESPONDENCE

OLD BUSINESS

The Town Board adopted a Resolution authorizing consolidation of Water District No. 9 and Water District No. 9 Extension 1. The Board signed a water maintenance Agreement with the Village of Holley to provide services for the 2020 year. The Preliminary Budget for the Year 2020 was accepted and the final budgeted adopted. Local Law No. 7 of the Year 2019 was adopted by Resolution.

NEW BUSINESS

Karen Bradshaw was appointed as a full member of the Planning Board to fill the unexpired term to expire 12/31/2021.




was born on April 25, 1867 in Clarendon, NY to Jerome and Sophronia Evarts Love. He was a resident of the area his entire life.

Mr. Love married his first wife Bertha on April 28, 1892. She died at the age of 31, just one year after their daughter Kate died following a two month illness at age 8. Another child of theirs Archie Love age 7 died September 21, 1911 of blood poisoning after receiving a vaccination.

Mr. Love married Edith Bannister Fancher in July 1909. They had three daughters and one son together.

Mr. Love died at the age of 76 on March 25, 1944 at the home of his son in Kendall, NY.

This very beautiful headstone is near the entrance of the cemetery where the chapel is located.



Hill Talk

Why a king in a stable?

I and those of us who celebrate Christmas will be totally enveloped in the wonderful sights, sounds, smells, tastes, and feelings of this holiday throughout the month. Cookies, pies, hams, parties, spices, decorations, lights at night, cool crisp nights, children's weislecarols, bells, family reunions, Christmas trees, and gifts will become part of our everyday lives. How well we enjoy all of these might depend on how well we can look past our problems and we certainly have a few. Do we have any help?

So a baby was born all those many years ago. So what? Yeah, I know. He was born in a stable, shepherds and wise men came and gave gifts and a big star shone in the sky. How does that help or relate to me—the **here and now** me?

Me with all those bills—me with a car on its last legs—me with a relentless addiction—me with that spare tire hanging off my stomach—me without a job—me separated from my family—me with that terrible disease—me unable to forgive—me fearful—me lonely—me ugly—and the "no one knows how bad am" me. Can God really be with me?

Jesus or "The Lord Saves" as his name means was also called Emmanuel which the scriptures tell us means "God with us". Since the times in the Garden of Eden when God walked among Adam and Eve, mankind's relationship with his Creator has been strained, to say the least, by the disobedience of mankind. This caused so much guilt that they built a high wall between themselves and their Lord.

God spoke through Isaiah the prophet promising that the Savior would come and would be known as the "God with us" or Emmanuel and that He would re-establish the links between man and God. Jesus, Emmanuel, would come into our world not among the scents of pines or cinnamon or the wonderful aromas of holiday cooking, but among the scents of musty straw and sweaty animals amid an angry overcrowded city begrudgingly responding to the commands of hated foreign rulers.

I think that the real message of Christmas is that God is with us, God is with us no matter what our condition is or what we've done. He is with us in the dirty stables of our lives---He is with us on the hard dusty journeys we must make---He is with us when we are rejected and have been turned away. So as we sing the wonderful hymns of the season, we should open our hearts and all that we are, even our own personal stables to Jesus, Emmanuel, God, with you now and forever.
