TAKE NOTICE that the Town of Clarendon is accepting sealed bids for the property located at 16572 Boots Road in the Town of Clarendon; parcel ID 120.-1-68. This 1.2-acre lot (200 X 246) is zoned Rural Agricultural (RA) and does not have access to the public water system. The condemned structure on the lot needs to be removed (taken down) and disposed of properly according to New York State Code. A bid with the best offer will be awarded with the stipulation that the condemned structure be removed and properly disposed of within one year of taking ownership. The Town of Clarendon reserves the right to refuse all bids. Bids may be submitted in person to the Town Clerk's Office at 16385 Church Street in Clarendon during regular business hours, or deposited in the mail drop to the west of the office door. Bids may also be mailed to PO Box 145, Clarendon, NY 14429. Please clearly mark the outside of the envelope with "Sealed Bid – Boots Road". Deadline to submit bids is May 18, 2021 close of business at 6:00 PM.

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CLARENDON TOWN BOARD Meeting Highlights - March 2021

Lindsay Frawley, representative of Power Management, gave a brief presentation of the energy services her company offers. Ms. Frawley had done a survey for the town using our current National Grid bills in an attempt to lower that expense for the town through a third-party purchase of energy. Ms. Frawley stated that the town should stay with National Grid as the supplier; that no significant savings is to be had by changing companies. Power management also does budgets and project analysis for solar projects and Ms. Frawley informed of Community Solar; the town could link to a grid that's open, not having to be in the Town of Clarendon, with no upfront payment. An agreement would be signed but the town would have the option to discontinue service with a 60 to 90 day notice. Of the three town accounts reviewed, the town uses approximately 45,000 kW hours; with solar, it would decrease 10% of electricity cost. On an annual basis it would be approximately \$364 in savings. Ms. Frawley left a contract with Supervisor Moy for the board's review.

Sandra Shaw, Director of the Holley Community Library reported that the Library is back open with regular hours. A summer program is planned and the Library has obtained a \$75,000 state grant. Work to be done with the grant includes upgrading electric, wheelchair access doors and fixing a 'hole in the wall'.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT REPORT

Superintendent Tracy Chalker reported snow plowing done. At the end of February there were substantial mechanical issues with the equipment that the crew was able to fix. A water leak on Fourth Section Road was repaired; the stem to curb stop was rusted. Pot holes are being patched; Wood Road and New Guinea Road have been graded. Superintendent Chalker reported responding to call on New Guinea road to find a five-foot-high wall of tires in the road. The New Ford 450 truck, purchased with grant funding, is on the road. Superintendent Chalker has completed education in Morrisville for his Grades D & C Water Operator Licenses. All highway employees are signed up for the course to obtain Grade D licenses; maybe one other employee will obtain the C license for back-up in the department. Superintendent Chalker informed that dead trees or those threatening road or electric line impediment were being looked at for trimming or removal.

SUPERVISOR REPORT

Supervisor Dick Moy informed of his writing letters to Assemblyman Hawley and Senator Ortt regarding items included in the state budget that affect the town; items included opposition to the state's planned 24% reduction in A.I.M. for towns; a request for increase in CHIPS funding for road repair at 10% and a local 'opt out' option for towns regarding marijuana legalization

(the counties can opt out and revenue from the sale will not be shared). Opposition was stated in the extension of non-termination of water services for non-payment of bills, questioning how a small town like Clarendon can survive with people not paying their water bills. Letters also written in opposition to Governor's proposal to allow NYS to establish a state-wide standardized approach for real property tax assessment for wind and solar projects abolishing town's ability to assess property used for said projects; it would eliminate local control and the ability to negotiate a PILOT with a developer. Supervisor reported that the assessor's computer access to the county site was down for weeks. The county is putting its own security system on the network. The county has sent a letter agreeing to liability of the assessor computer if a virus infects it. Supervisor wants to meet with the county regarding liability of all town computers, server and network.

CORRESPONDENCE

The Orleans County Legislature has adopted a Resolution approving appointments to the County Planning Board; Kevin Johnson as full member; Russell Bosch as alternate. A copy of Senator Schumer's prepared remarks for the New York State Association of Towns Annual meeting has been received.

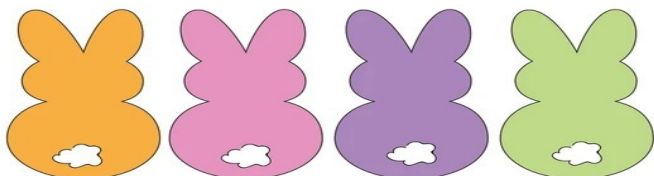
OLD BUSINESS

Discussion was held regarding the town property at 16572 Boots Road in Clarendon. Supervisor contacted a realtor that specializes in such properties and they won't list it; said to get the best offer possible and stipulate removal of the house. Cost for teardown was estimated at \$6000. There is no public water at the property. Town Board in agreement to advertise for sealed bids on the property, contingent that the house be torn down; in the paper and on the internet.

NEW BUSINESS

The Town received notice that the public WiFi license for the internet hotspot services on the outside of the town hall is up for renewal. Microsoft paid \$105 for the first year, now the town needs to pay for it to continue. Town Board voted to discontinue public WiFi. Short discussion was held reinstituting seasonal use permits in the zoning ordinance with unanimous board opposition; not passed.

The Town Board gave authorization for the USDA to again access town properties in regard to its European Cherry Fruit Fly Program. Michelle Chalker, Save Time Cleaning Services, was hired to clean the town hall. The Board went into a 15 minute executive session regarding a personnel issue; no action was taken.

Enoch Andrus

was born in Westfield, MA in 1809. When he was six years old, he moved with his family to Clarendon. The family settled on Lot 45 on the Merrill Road and Enoch lived there until his death in 1886. He married Hannah, who passed at an early age in 1833. He then married Abigail and they were together nearly 40 years. She died as well in 1886.



In 1829 Enoch Andrus of Clarendon, with a score of others, walked to Buffalo via Byron and Batavia to see the Thayer brothers hung. They stayed for the night at a tavern about five miles from Buffalo. Buffalo at that time was a small village, and the hanging took place on the west side of Main Street near the Terrace. All the boats in the harbor were loaded with people to witness the execution. The three prisoners were all hung simultaneously. The next day the party went to see Niagara Falls, which was surrounded by wilderness, then on to Lockport via Lewiston and a packet boat from Lockport to Holley and home.



Enoch was survived by his wife and two daughters. His funeral was held at his home and attended by a large group of people. During all his years he was widely known as an honored citizen, a good neighbor, a devoted husband and father. He was an industrious, thrifty farmer.

An uncle came from Italy to claim them but the Rochester Children's Aide society had gone to court and had them legally adopted out. Doing genealogy was a bit tricky here!

Talking with Someone is Good for your Health

All this social distancing, staying in place has now been going on over a year. Who would have ever imagined last March we would be still in this situation. Due to this, we are all feeling a bit more disconnected and/or isolated. Individuals 60+ years of age naturally begin to see their social circles getting smaller, and finding opportunities to just visit/talk with others becomes even more difficult in “normal” years. This is why the Orleans County Friendly Phones Program was created. This program is FREE of charge and not based on income levels! You simply need to

be 60 years old or older. Our volunteer driven program provides a weekly phone call to a client for the sole purpose of friendly conversation. These friendly calls are designed to be 60 minutes in length for general conversation, sharing stories and likely some laughs. Sometimes, clients find it hard to talk that long. The flexibility of this program allows the volunteer and client to decide if either a shorter call or possibly more than one call a week works best. The beauty of this program is **you**. **You**, the client, along with your volunteer manage and work out all the details. It’s about your comfort level, schedule and needs in order to decrease social isolation. All our volunteers go through training, background checks, and give their areas of interest. We work hard to match up people with common interests, likes/dislikes and from similar areas of the county. WHEN this sheltering in place restrictions ease up, we are hoping to reopen for in person visits. However, if your comfort level is not there yet, you may want to remain with phone calls only. That is your choice. We always like to match veterans with other veterans, for their camaraderie is like no other. How about it? We have volunteers all trained and ready to start connecting with you. Give us a call at **585-343-0614 Ext. 18**. Please leave your name and number if you get the voicemail as we are continuing to work remotely and check our messages daily. We are currently conducting our intakes for new clients over the phone for added safety. We will come meet with you once we are given a clearance from our CEO/Board to resume visits. Burning Prohibitions

Open burning is prohibited in New York, with several exceptions: Campfires less than 3 feet in height and 4 feet in length, width or diameter are allowed. Small cooking fires are allowed. Fires cannot be left unattended and must be fully extinguished. Only charcoal or clean, untreated or unpainted wood can be burned. Ceremonial or celebratory bonfires are allowed. In towns with a total population less than 20,000, you may burn tree limbs with attached leaves. The limbs must be less than 6 inches in diameter and 8 feet in length (also referred to as brush).

However, this is not allowed from **March 16 through May 14** due to the increased risk of wildfires. The practice of burning large piles of brush collected from local residents at town or county transfer sites is prohibited. The individual landowners in small towns may burn their brush on site as discussed above. Downed limbs and branches generated at a transfer site are also allowed to be burned on site with the same restrictions. See Section 215.3 (link leaves DEC's website) for a full list of exceptions.

Please note: While most firewood must be untreated, some firewood is heat treated (kiln dried) to control invasive insect species if it is to be transported over 50 miles. Heat treated firewood is not intended to be prohibited. However, the burning of chemically treated wood such as pressure-treated lumber and plywood is prohibited. Do Not Burn Household Trash. Burning trash is prohibited statewide in all cases. Our existing incinerator rule already prohibits burning household trash in wood stoves, fireplaces, and outdoor wood boilers.

DEC recommends that you recycle all appropriate materials (such as newspaper, paper, glass and plastic) and compost your organic kitchen and garden waste. Burning leaves also is banned in New York State. We encourage you to compost leaves. Disposal of flags or religious items in a small-sized fire is allowed if it is not otherwise prohibited by law or regulation.
