



# CLARENDON TOWN BOARD Meeting Highlights - APRIL 2022

### HIGHWAY/WATER REPORT

Superintendent Tracy Chalker thanked his crew for the many long hours worked this year during the brutal winter and in his absence for a couple of weeks; Clarendon has a good crew! Plowing and salting was done in late March and early April. Trucks are being prepared for the summer; cleaning and painting the plows. The first quarter water readings are complete. The crew has picked up a lot of brush from earlier wind storms; trees at the Town Hall have been cleaned and trimmed and dead trees along roadsides have been removed with the help of the county. Several dead deer have been picked up from the side of the road. The town's roller has been delivered to the Holley School for use on the sports fields. There were three burials at Hillside Cemetery. The crew has been hauling stone for the Village of Holley waterline project through the shared program. The 403 Sterling has been cleaned and is ready for auction on May 14, 2022; the 405 was taken to Beam Mack to fix a def default alarm. A fire hydrant was hit on NYS Route 31A; no report was filed with the sheriff so we don't know who did it. The Village of Holley is scheduled to repair or replace it. The highway crew has been working on yard repairs and cleaning intersections with a rake and broom. The crew is replacing water meters purchased with the ARPA funding; over 30 have been replaced this week. Notice of state funding was received today. The towns were pushing for a 20% increase; 3% was received but everyone in Orleans County took a loss as the funding went somewhere else. CHIPS is down 2%; Extreme Winter Recovery stayed the same and PAVE NY is down 1%. Cost of chip sealing through Suit-Kote is up 20% this year; still waiting for price of blacktop from the state. The money budgeted for roads won't go far this year.

The Planning Board interviewed a candidate for a one (1) year appointment to the open Alternate position on the Planning Board. By unanimous consent they will submit the name of Michelle Lipke to the Town Board for their consideration and approval.

### HISTORIAN/HISTORICAL SOCIETY REPORT

Historian Melissa Ierlan submitted the following written report: Planning on having some displays set up inside the chapel at Hillside for Memorial Day to coincide with whatever the American Legion and VFW are doing. John Patt, son of Debbie and Jim Patt is busy working on his eagle scout project which is a pavilion on the canal in Holley. He took on a pretty substantial project and so far, it looks amazing. Steve Hawley visited with him and posted a picture on his Facebook page along with other pictures including Jacob Crandall's flagpole veteran's monument in Hillside.

### SUPERVISOR REPORT

Deputy Supervisor Allen Robinson reviewed that in 2014 the Town Board voted to be a 'Climate Smart Community'. At the time special lighting was put in. The Office of the State Comptroller sent a survey to be completed regarding how the town is addressing climate change and how much spending is being done to adapt to climate change. The survey pertained mostly to water levels and flooding which did not pertain to Clarendon. Deputy Supervisor Robinson did ask the representative about funding to take care of the many ash trees that are dying and are a hazard along roadways; that it will be a burden on the town and the fire company.

# **CORRESPONDENCE**

The Town has received \$42,289.21 in payment for first quarter 2022 sales tax revenue. Updates on the solar project in Byron, Genesee County have been received. Deputy Supervisor reported that the project includes 3443 acres for 280 MW; that it is pretty much approved. Residents had asked for state consideration to not allow prime farm land for solar projects; it did not make a difference. The County will hold a Self-Insurance Quarterly Meeting on April 26, 2022 at 10:30 AM. Deputy Supervisor Robinson will attend.

### **OLD BUSINESS**

The Town Board adopted a SEQR Resolution for the proposed zoning ordinance amendments, issuing a negative declaration for the action. Transfer of Certificate of Non-Conformance for 16179 East Lee Road was addressed. Kevin Manna presented a notarized affidavit from Jamie Lynn Halstead, prior owner of the property, stating that the underground gas tanks in the front of the building and the oil storage tank behind the building have been closed, cleaned and removed from the property. Mr. Manna said that it can clearly be seen where the tanks were in the parking lot; that the Supervisor told him he would be satisfied with an affidavit and thought the board would be also. The tanks were removed prior to DEC needing paperwork. Regarding the septic, lines and tank have been dug up and inspected by a licensed inspector. Results have been sent to the county health department and they were satisfied; OIO lerlan has talked to the health department. Councilman

Superintendent Chalker reported it a very good program and benefits the towns greatly. The Town Board adopted a Resolution authorizing the USDA access to town properties for trapping invasive pests. Michelle Lipke was appointed as an Alternate Member of the Planning Board; term to expire 12/31/2022.

2021 was another year of upheaval as we all responded to the challenges COVID caused. Throughout all of this, however, your library has been there for you. Mrs. Shaw and the Library Board developed and modified policies and procedures to ensure the safety and well-being of the community and library staff and to ensure that community members would have access to the library materials and internet within the guidelines set by NY State, Orleans County and the CDC. Your library was only closed for a few weeks. When it was open, materials and the facility were rigorously sanitized. When it was not possible for patrons to enter the facility, Mrs. Shaw continued the procedure whereby community members could call, text or request library materials online and then have them bagged for pickup in the library foyer. Deliveries continued to be made to home bound community members. Procedures continued in place to meet community copying and faxing needs. With the library being a hot spot, 24/7 access to the internet was provided to the community from outside the library. Until her accepting a position at another library in July, the Children's Librarian provided virtual story hours, projects and activities. The Library Board is actively seeking a new Children's Librarian, but in the meantime, services have continued to be provided for our young patrons. In-library story hours were continued on Wednesdays by Mrs. Shaw, Board members, and library staff members. Grab and Go materials were also provided on a weekly basis and thematic displays of children's materials have been created by Mrs. Shaw and the staff. A free lending library has been established at Holley Gardens. Noting the importance of the services your library has been providing to the community, local and state legislators have been providing Mrs. Shaw with FREE N-95 masks and COVID test kits to be given to community members, all of which have been available at the circulation desk. Upon further inspection of the water-damaged wall in the Children's Room, it was discovered that the damage extended farther along the wall. The repairs were completed and covered by the grant obtained by Mrs. Shaw, ensuring the work was done at NO COST TO THE COMMUNITY. This grant also included the installation of high efficiency lighting and the handicap accessible doors. Again, this was work done at no cost to the community. Your library is here for you. Your library... Provides resources and activities for the whole family; Provides 24/7 online access through the library website to an online catalog and selected electronic resources and databases; Has equitable access to computers and other forms of technology; Has summer reading programs for children and young adults; Has adult/young adult programs as well as children's story hours and programs; Participates in resources sharing throughout the NIOGA system; Provides free meeting space for groups; Has upgraded its homeschool collection; Has contacts with companies such as Teacher Geek and its STEAM products; Is always available to help with questions and concerns, to do programs and obtain materials, all based on patron request. We are here for you. Please vote on May 17, 2022. The Proposition for the library budget will be included with the vote for the Holley School District budget. The budget on which you will be voting on May 17 will be \$194,966, a 3% increase over the previous year's budget. The largest part of the budget is staff salaries, where we increased funding to be parallel to those provided by large local chains. In trying to keep the budget reasonable, cuts were made in many areas but not those providing service to the community. ### CleanSweepNY Services are Not Available to Homeowners.

CleanSweepNY services are provided to farmers and owners of former farms, all categories of NYS certified pesticide applicators, cemeteries, golf courses, marinas, schools, landscapers and lawncare providers, nurseries, greenhouses, and other entities possessing unwanted or unusable pesticides and other waste chemicals. Each participant is responsible for transporting their materials to the collection site.



CleanSweepNY results in enhanced stewardship of the environment through the improved management and proper disposal of unusable pesticides and other chemical wastes. These materials may pose human health risks upon exposure and represent a potential hazard to New York State's groundwater and surface water resources.

The collections are scheduled and organized by NYSDEC with the collaboration of NYSDOT who generously provides sites for the collection of these unwanted chemical materials. CleanSweepNY is supported by Cornell Cooperative Extension, the Agricultural Container Recycling Council, Soil and Water

Conservation Districts, New York Farm Bureau, and other related grower associations.

# **Pest Alert**



# **Box Tree Moth**



This invasive pest primarily feeds and completes its life cycle on boxwood species. In its native range, it also feeds on burning bush, Japanese spindle tree, purple holly and orange jessamine once nearby boxwoods are completely defoliated. Signs of damage may not appear at the beginning of an infestation because young larvae hide among twigs and leaves. Larvae skeletonize the leaves and feed on the bark causing defoliation and dryness, leading to the plant's death. Signs of feeding include green-black frass (excrement) and webbing. The female moths lay their eggs on the underside of the leaves of boxwoods. If you find an insect you suspect is the box tree moth in NY please report it to have the specimen identified properly.
