CLARENDON TOWN BOARD Meeting Highlights - October, 2024

Supervisor Moy opened a special meeting at 6:30PM where the board reviewed and adopted a Resolution authorizing re-levied zoning violations, mowing charges and water charges to be added to 2025 property tax bills. The public hearing scheduled for consideration of proposed Local Law No. 1 of 2024 to Override the Tax Levy Limit Established in General Municipal Law 3-c with the 2025 budget was opened at 6:45 PM. Supervisor reported that the 2025 budget will not override the tax levy limit and the local law is not needed.

OPEN END

Lauren Kelly, Director of State Government Affairs for Charter Communications, locally known as Spectrum, asked the board to reconsider approving the proposed franchise agreement; that this agreement is a formality; a renewal to protect both parties. Pursuant to the NYS Public Service Commission, Charter is trying to keep franchise agreements current. The agreement allows the cable company to work within the right of way and upgrade its equipment in the town. Councilman Robinson felt the town needs to discuss how all residents can get service before signing the agreement. Ms. Kelly informed that cable television is available to everyone; it's the internet that is not. She intends to meet with the county soon regarding services; that if the county and/or town can put in funds with Spectrum servicing more residents may be doable. Councilman Robinson reviewed the town survey taken and submitted to the county, indicating the roads and homes that did not have services available. The town will try to get a list of the properties to Ms. Kelly. No action was taken. Ms. Kelly stated she would be back.

CLARENDON FIRE COMPANY

Fire Chief Bob Freida and Vice-President Craig Hadden gave third quarter report to the town board. From January 1 through October 14, 2024, 311 calls have been answered; 224 of them EMS. The Fire Co. budget year begins April 1st; we are through 58% of the year; 63% of the budget. The big bills are paid at the beginning of the year, i.e. insurance, truck maintenance, physicals ... The fire company has replaced an AED, purchased three multi-gas meters and a thermal imagining camera. Twenty-one members completed 2,284 hours of service; 643 hours were training. Two members have been lost to death, Marge Morse and Kerry McCormack; two new members have signed up. The liquor license was in the process of being renewed, but since Kerry's death, the process has to start all over taking his name off the license. The recreation hall split is still an on-going process. The attorney still has not filed a quit-claim deed; things are very slow to get done with him. Clarendon Fire Company has signed into agreement with the Murray Fire Department. Both companies are on full mutual assist; both are dispatched simultaneously for all calls. It is working well and Chief Freida feels it is better serving the community. Craig Hadden is the Vice-President and the current acting President until elections in December. Acknowledgement was given to Marge Morse for her service in the Fire Police and the Town Zoning Board of Appeals and to the community in general through her church. Kerry McCormack was acknowledged for all his work in the Clarendon Fire Company and the daily jobs that now need to be given to another person to do. These people were said to be a big loss to both the fire company and commu-

HIGHWAY/WATER DEPARTMENT REPORT

Superintendent Tracy Chalker confirmed for Supervisor Moy that two rollers are needed for a paving job; the county rents one and they own

one; Clarendon pays a share for the rental. Superintendent Chalker reported that South Holley Road is supposed to be re-opened October 25, 2024 after the culvert/bridge repair. The third roadside mowing is complete, the hills in Hillside Cemetery have been bush-hogged and repair needed from water work has been done to some yards; there are three more to do. The crew placed shoulders on New Guinea Road, Merrill Road and Boots Road with assistance from Towns of Barre and Shelby. Clarendon helped other towns through the work share program; Murray had a water leak, county paving, hauled material for the Village of Holley and took the grader to the Murray parking lot. Intersections have been swept from the chip-seal. Third quarter water reads are completed. Trucks have been inspected and oil changed. Plow frames were put on all trucks and two are completely already set up for snow. Multiple trees have been cleaned up and roadside-killed deer have been picked up. Town properties have been mowed and routine water maintenance continues. The new fuel pumps are installed and in full operation. Superintendent Chalker reviewed town board discussion regarding purchase of the new plow truck and submitted a quote for an insert style salter box that will throw the salt behind the truck instead of under it. Town Board approved the additional \$7000 to purchase the insert style salter, which will last for use in three to four trucks; an approximate of 40-45-year life.

No **Planning Board** Meetings held this past month; no report.

HISTORIAN/HISTORICAL SOCIETY REPORT

Historian Melissa Ierlan submitted the following written report: The first meeting for United Way's respite program at the museum was last Thursday. It went very well. There were several folks in attendance and they were very comfortable in the space. Nyla Gaylord was able to get a grant to fund this program. We are hoping once the word gets out that more people from the immediate area will attend. The building will be open through the winter so we have taken steps to make sure the pipes are protected from freezing. Our Eagle Scout project is almost done and once the final paperwork gets turned in hopefully, we can have a little celebration at the museum for Johnathan. The scout pack from Brockport was in the cemetery last week to clean headstones. It was very well attended and we even had resident Kevin Rombaut bring down his tractor and help stand up one of the very large headstones that had fallen over. Our Rotary Interact event scheduled for this past Sunday was canceled due to the cold and wind and rain all day. They will do another one in the spring. Bob Barrett has once again made a beautiful sign for the historical society. It is hanging on the new picnic pavilion and looks amazing! We have a speaker tomorrow Oct. 16th at 7pm. Healing Waters: The Spas of Western NY by Erica Wisniewski. Several years ago, she did one on medicine from the 1800's. Next month we will have Ray Cianfrini from Oakfield speaking about the KKK in Orleans and Genesee County during the late 1800's. Our Christmas parade is scheduled for December 6th this year. More details to follow.

With that the old man opened the scale house door and the sight that greeted him stopped him in his tracks. Forty truckers stood there saluting him and he saluted them back. And then in a tired and trembling voice he addressed them in this way:

"I thank you for your kindness ... and God Bless the U.S.A.!"

Adams were there to award the winners and reported that great fun was had by all.



TEXT OF PROPOSITION ONE, An Amendment

To Be on Ballot in the November 5, 2024 General Election

Concurrent Resolution of the Senate and Assembly proposing an amendment to Section 11 of Article 1 of the constitution, in relation to equal protection. Section 1. Resolved (if the Assembly concur). That Section 11 of Article 1 of the constitution be amended to read as follows: Section 11. a. No person shall be denied the equal protection of the laws of this State or any subdivision thereof. No person shall, because of race, color, ethnicity, national origin, age, disability, creed [or], religion, or sex, including sexual orientation, gender identify, gender expression, pregnancy, pregnancy outcomes and reproductive healthcare and autonomy, be subjected to any discrimination in [his or her] their civil rights by any other person or by any firm, corporation, or institution, or by the state or any agency or subdivision of the state. Pursuant to law. b. Nothing in this section shall invalidate or prevent the adoption of any law, regulation, program or practice that is designed to prevent or dismantle discrimination on the basis of a characteristic listed in this section nor shall any characteristic listed in this section be interpreted to interfere with, limit or deny the civil rights of any person based upon any other characteristic identified in this section. Section 2. Resolved (if the Assembly concur), that the foregoing amendment be submitted to the people for approval at the general election to be held in the year 2024 in accordance with the provisions of the election law. Explanation – Matter in underscored is new; matter in brackets [] is old law to be omitted.

CORRESPONDENCE

The Orleans County Board of Elections has sent notice regarding the November 5, 2024 election. Association of Towns offers workers' compensation self-insurance through Comp Alliance; Supervisor will get a quote for coverage. In order to pull out of the Orleans County Self-Insurance, the town needs to submit a letter by July; cost for current insurance is \$27,000/year with no claims. Quote will be for consideration in 2025. The 2025 Annual Meeting & Training School of Association of Towns will be from February 16-19, 2025 in New York City. Monroe Ambulance has sent a letter of sympathy for Kerry McCormack's passing. New York State Agriculture & Markets has reported that the dog control officer inspection was rated satisfactory. The municipal shelter inspection was rated unsatisfactory; repairs are needed at the shelter. The Sheriff and Building & Grounds are developing a plan for repairs. New York State Aid has been received in the amount of \$11,416.00. The NYS Comptroller has sent a report of the town's fiscal stress; based on one to one hundred (closer to 100 is more stress financially). Clarendon is rated at 5.0. Notice of voting in New York State has been received showing registration, early voting and absentee voting deadlines.




Híllsíde Sketches

Instead of my usual Hillside Sketch, I would like to take the time to celebrate the life of a dear friend whom many of you may know of.

Marlies Adams DiFante left this earth after her 91st birthday. I had the good fortune of meeting her through her son, Clarendon's Judge

Tom DiFante. He told me about her book and I read it in one day. I was so blown away reading her life experience of living through and surviving WWII as a child. She and her family had traveled to Germany from the USA to visit her sick grandfather. They were not permitted to leave once the borders were closed. Marlies spoke three times in Clarendon and once at our high school. Each

time I heard new information about her experiences. I urge everyone to read her book *Queen of the Bremen* and see what happened through her eyes of the 7 years they spent in Germany. Marlies was very wise for a child of her age and she paid attention to everything and questioned why. Her Oma once told her that on earth there are things that you don't like to do but to do them anyway. She said "do them for a brick" and that way someday you'll build yourself a beautiful home in heaven with all the bricks you earned during your time on earth. She was always



thankful for the blessings God gave her and mentioned it in her book frequently. She said her prayers and thanked God for giving her a chance at a decent life. She even prayed for her special cow who for a year was her best and only friend and source of comfort while she endured life living with her aunt who was a Nazi informer. Her beloved Opa once told her how special she was and that he knew Marlies often wondered if God had forgotten her. He told her that God never forgets and that he had done so many kind



things for her to enable her to keep living. She made it through the war as did her precious family. He told her that there would always be evil people in the world and that she must forgive them, forget what happened and move on. I have to think that on the day God finally welcomed her into heaven he greeted her with love and kindness and showed her the beautiful house that she had built and that all of her loved ones, including her cow were there to greet her.


